Reflections

The Gospel of the Lord!

From the beginning, reading from one of the four gospels has been a high point of our Sunday assembling to give thanks and praise. For good reason, too. Christ comes to us in word as well as in deed, in the scriptures as well as in the sharing of his body and blood. And while we know that God speaks to us in all of holy scripture, at Mass we are most eager to hear the gospel, the good news of the very words and deeds of Jesus. (That is what the Old English word “gospel” means after all, “good news,” “God’s news.”) So when it is time, we jump to our feet. We acclaim the coming of the gospel with that most ancient and holy of words: Alleluia! (Unless it is Lent, our season of sorrow when we fast from our glorious word just like Israel in exile hung up its harps.) Fast to our feet, singing loud praise, we watch as the deacon (or the priest) takes up the Book of the Gospels. Accompanied by servers with candles, perhaps with fragrant clouds of incense from another server’s bowl, the Book of the Gospels makes its way through our assembly from altar to ambo. It sat on the altar from the start of Mass as a sign that Christ is present in the gospel. Now it is taken “up to the heights” to be proclaimed from the ambo, just as Jesus preached the sermon on the mount, or the apostles, drunk with the Holy Spirit, shouted joy from Jerusalem’s Pentecost rooftops. As the deacon announces that this is from Matthew or Mark, from Luke or John, we trace the sign of the cross on our foreheads (may we understand this good news!), on our lips (may we always speak and spread this good news!), and over our hearts (may we love and always live this good news!) Then we listen. We stand together and listen. We stand and listen like a servant being given orders, like an honored guest being whose deeds are recounted, like a convicted criminal before the judge’s bench, like the beloved being met in haste by the lover. And when it is spoken, when the last word for this day has sunk deep within, the deacon looks to us and says, “The gospel of the Lord!” to which we cry, “Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!” What else could we possibly say?




We strongly encourage everyone to register their children as soon as possible. Registration prior to the dates above do not guarantee a spot!!! We are capping the number of spots on each team (based on sport) and spots will be allocated on a first come first serve basis. We are looking to avoid the situation of fielding teams with too many players, which leads to an unpleasant experience for the child and puts undue burden on our (volunteer) coaches. If there is excessive demand and enough time given to react, the CYO can field more than one team in an age group. In the event that we are able to accept a registration for a sport past the date above, a \$25 late fee will be assessed.

Pope Interview: Talks with China, Migration, Chile Abuse Crisis



Pope Francis interviewed by Reuter's Philip Pulella (Vatican Media)

2018-06-20 — BY SUSY HODGES — In a new one-on-one interview Pope Francis has responded to a series of questions on various issues including the Holy See's talks with China, the position of women within the Church, migration policy, populism, Chile's clerical sex abuse crisis and reform of the Roman Curia.

Talks with China "at a good point"

Asked in the interview about relations with China, Pope Francis said he was optimistic about the outcome of normalization talks with the Chinese authorities saying they were "at a good point" but couldn't say when they would conclude. He acknowledged that dialogue "is a risk" but said he preferred that to "the certain defeat" of not holding a dialogue with Beijing.

The Pope talked at length about immigration during the interview and was asked about the U.S. administration's policy of separating migrant families at the U.S./Mexican border. In his reply, he said he supported recent statements issued by U.S. Catholic Bishops who called the separation of children from their parents contrary to Catholic values and immoral.

Turning to the migration situation in Europe, the Holy Father said populists were "creating a psychosis" on the issue of immigration, even as ageing societies like Europe faced "a great demographic winter" and needed more immigrants. "I believe that you cannot reject people who arrive. You have to receive them, help them, look after them, accompany them and then see where to put them, but throughout all of Europe," he said. He praised Italy and Greece for being "courageous and generous" by taking in these migrants.

Populism is not the solution

Pope Francis warned that populism does not resolve issues like migration problems. "What resolves things is acceptance, study, prudence," he said. The Pope also said Europe should stop exploiting Africa and invest in ways that benefit the continent more and this could help solve the problem of migration at its roots.

When asked about women calling for more top positions in the Roman Curia, Pope Francis said he agreed there were few women in positions of responsibility there. He said he wanted to appoint more women to head Vatican departments because "women are better at resolving conflicts." At the same time, he reiterated that women cannot be ordained to the priesthood. "(Pope) John Paul II was clear on this point and closed the door and I am not going back on that," he said.

Chile's clerical sex abuse crisis was another topic discussed at length during the interview. Pope Francis has accepted the resignation of three bishops in Chile and said he could accept more resignations in the future.

He spoke of how he returned "a bit worried" after his pastoral visit to Chile in January this year and explained why he decided to send Archbishop Charles Scicluna to the Latin American nation to carry out further investigations into the abuse crisis.

Pope: Commandments Are Path to Freedom

2018-06-20 — BY DEVIN WATKINS — Pope Francis began the Wednesday General Audience with a personal greeting to some 200 sick and disabled people gathered in the Paul VI Audience Hall. He told the pilgrims basking with him under the hot sun in St. Peter's Square that the two groups form a single community.

Turning to his catechesis, Pope Francis continued his reflection on the Commandments, calling them "Ten Words for living the Covenant". The Scriptures (Exodus 20:1), he said, do not call them "Commandments" but says "God spoke all these words."

Commandments establish dialogue

They are "objectively commandments", the Pope said, but the difference between a word and a commandment is important.

He said a command doesn't require a dialogue

"The word, however, is an essential means for a relationship based on dialogue. God the Father creates through his word, and the Son is the Word made flesh. Love feeds on words, as does education or collaboration."

Relationship with Trinity

In giving the Ten Words or Commandments, God continues his covenantal dialogue with His people, inviting them and us to shape our lives in a loving relationship with the Trinity.

“The Commandments are a dialogue,” Pope Francis said. “The difference is not artificial.”

He said the Tempter in the Book of Genesis tries to convince the man and the woman that God is a despot demanding blind obedience. But God, he said, “is a Father that loves us all” and is concerned for the welfare of His children.

Holy Spirit leads on path of freedom

Pope Francis then spoke about how the Holy Spirit helps us to accept and obey God’s law, not out of constraint, but out of the awareness that it is the path to authentic human fulfillment.

“The commandments,” he said, “are the path towards freedom, because they are the Father’s word, which makes us free to walk this path... with the heart of sons and daughters.”

Pope at Mass: Forgive, Love Our Enemies



2018-06-19 — VATICAN — Pope Francis at Mass on Tuesday morning said the mystery of Christian life is loving our enemies and praying for our persecutors.

He drew inspiration from the day’s Gospel (Mt 5:43-48), in which Jesus invites his followers to a higher standard of human relations, so as to be “perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect.”

The Holy Father said forgiveness, prayer, and love for those who seek to destroy us is the path Jesus has laid out for us.

Forgive to be forgiven

The challenge of Christian life, he said, is asking the Lord for the grace “to bless our enemies” and to love them.

“To pray for those who want to destroy me, my enemies, so that God may bless them: This is truly difficult to understand. We can recall events of the last century, like the poor Russian Christians who, simply for being Christians, were sent to Siberia to die of cold. And they should pray for the executing government that sent them there? How can that be? Yet many did so: they prayed. We think of Auschwitz and other concentration camps. Should they pray for the dictator who sought a ‘pure race’ and killed without scruple, even to pray that God should bless him? And yet many did so.”

Learn from Jesus and martyrs

Pope Francis said Jesus’ “difficult logic” is contained in his prayer for those who put him to death on the Cross.

Jesus asks God to forgive them, he said.

“There is an infinite distance between us – we who frequently refuse to forgive even small things – and what the Lord asks of us, which he has exemplified for us: To forgive those who seek to destroy us. It is often very difficult within families, for example, when spouses need to forgive one another after an argument, or when one needs to forgive their mother-in-law. It’s not easy... Rather, [we are invited] to forgive those who are killing us, who want us out of the way... Not only forgive, but even pray that God may watch over them! Even more, to love them. Only Jesus’ word can explain this.”

Perfect like the Father

Finally, Pope Francis said it is a grace “to understand this Christian mystery and be perfect like the Father, who gives good things to the good and the bad.”

“It would do us well, today, to think of our enemy – I think all of us have one – someone who has hurt us or wants to hurt us. The Mafia’s prayer is: ‘You’ll pay me back.’ The Christian prayer is: ‘Lord, give them your blessing, and teach me to love them.’ Let us think of one enemy, and pray for them. May the Lord to give us the grace to love them.”
