From the Pastor

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Item 1

Item 2

MINISTERS OF HOSPITALITY(GREETERS)

I would like to have a more formal Ministry of Hospitality/Greeters in the parish. Sr. Kathleen and I have spoken about this at length for quite some time, but other things kept pushing this to the back burner (Covid included). For many years, the Holy Name Society would take up the collection and serve as Ushers at Mass. A few men are still very faithful to this on Sundays, and I am indeed grateful to them. However, the ministry is more than just taking up the collection. It involves greeting people as they enter, helping them find a seat (this was especially important when distancing rules were in effect and may be important again depending on the situation with Covid), being available in emergency situations, directing people at Communion time, choosing people to bring up the gifts in the Offertory Pro-

cession (so the priest is not standing waiting for someone to get the gifts). I would love to see a team composed of at least 4 people for each Mass (since many people attend the same Mass every weekend) and two alternates that can be called on if someone cannot make it on a given weekend. This ministry is open to both men and women. If you are interested in this ministry or in learning more about it, please contact Msgr. Tom at 718-428-2200, ext. 103.

I have already received two volunteers for the Saturday evening 5 P.M; 2 volunteers for the 8AM Mass; 3 volunteers for the 10 AM Mass and 1 volunteer for the 12PM Mass. Thank you to these individuals for volunteering! I know there are more of you out there who are thinking about it! Please consider joining me in formalizing this ministry in our parish which aids all of us in ensuring a welcoming atmosphere to our parish and helps ensure the dignity required for our celebration of the Eucharist.

Item 3

The Rosary is prayed each day at 8:30 AM. In the past, the Rosary was prayed after the 9:00 Am Mass but due to the pandemic the schedule changed. It will be prayed at this time for the foreseeable future. Many say that the time slot is too early, but it is the best we can do given the situation. I wish (and hope) more people will try to come early to pray the Rosary each day before Mass. Remember that Our Lady asked at Fatima that we pray the Rosary but also asked that we make sacrifices. Making an effort to come to church earlier to pray the Rosary is a good sacrifice to offer our Lord. In the future I hope to unite this daily Rosary with a parish initiative to pray for the sanctification of the clergy and an increase of vocations to the Priesthood and Consecrated Life. More on the will be forthcoming in the future.

Item 5

On All Souls Day, Tuesday, November 2, we are invited to pray for all our deceased friends and relatives. Envelopes to submit the names of those you wish to be prayed for are in your envelope packet and are available at the back of the church and by the side entrance. . These envelopes, with the names of your deceased loved ones, will remain in a basket near the altar throughout the month of November and will be prayed for each day.

As we are reminded in the Scriptures: "It is a good and pious thing to pray for the dead." Remember the offering of Mass for a deceased person and praying for them are two means to help a soul in Purgatory. Let us remember that one day we might be where they are now and will be hoping that someone's prayers will assist us.

Item 6

ANNUAL CATHOLIC APPEAL 2021--As of October 25, 194 parishioners/individuals have already pledged \$109,895.00 to the 2021 ACA and \$105,395.05 has been paid. This means we have fulfilled our assigned goal and all monies now collected come back to the parish. (We still have \$4,499.95 in pledged monies to be fulfilled) Our goal was \$91,954.00. Many thanks to all for their generosity! I am especially grateful to the family that pledged \$30,000.00 and paid this pledge in full. Please prayerfully consider participating in the ACA 2021 if you have not yet done so. **Please remember that all monies now collected over goal come back to the parish 100%. The parish really counts on this money that is a result of our going over-goal to help us with some of our larger bills each year, i.e., the Annual Assessment Bill., the Annual Insurance Bill, etc.**

The money collected for the ACA 2021 is not used for any other purpose other than what is listed in the information brochures, i.e., training of seminarians, support for senior priests, hospital ministry, youth ministry, lay leader formation, etc.

THERE IS STILL TIME TO CONSIDER A PLEDGE/ DONATION AS WE COME CLOSE TO THE END OF THE YEAR. WE ARE OVERGOAL SO ALL MONIES WILL COME BACK TO THE PARISH IN FULL!

Item 7

I am presently working with the Diocesan Buildings Office (DBO) regarding the air conditioning replacement. No decisions have been made but in preliminary discussions it appears that the project will cost approximately \$200,000.00 I am also working with them to get estimated for putting a fence around our parking lot for reasons that I shared with you in previous bulletins and for installing a security system in the

church and on our parish property. These things take time, and I must follow the procedures set forth by the Diocese in these matters. Matters such as these are also on "temporary hold" until the new Bishop is installed on November 30.

Item 8

Please remember that the work of the parish takes place 24 hours a day-7 days a week-365 days a year. Even though you might not be present at a particular Sunday or holy day Mass, or you may be away for the summer the parish depends on your weekly contributions to meet its bills and carry out its mission. Please send in your weekly envelopes or consider signing up for online giving- this takes the burden off you to remember to send in your make up contributions and helps us to better plan our cash flow. Much thanks to those who are faithful in making their contributions even while away! Very much appreciated!

Item 9

Please join us in Eucharistic Adoration in the church on Thursdays from 1:00 P.M.-2:00 P.M. Thursdays are special days of prayer in thanksgiving for the gift of the Eucharist (prayer especially needed since 70% of those identifying as Catholic do not believe in the Real Presence of Our Lord in the Eucharist) and for praying for an increase of vocations to the Priesthood and Religious Life. The Holy Hour consists of Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, praying the Rosary, quiet time for silent prayer and meditation and Benediction. Come, worship the Lord!

God, Neighbor, and Self


This Week's Readings at Mass

- ▶ Deuteronomy 6:2-6 - The Great Commandment
- ▶ Hebrews 7:23-28 - Jesus, the eternal high priest
- ▶ Mark 12:28b-34 - The Greatest Commandment

The law that Moses proclaims in the first reading comes in the chapter after the listing of the Ten Commandments; it is sometimes called the *Great Commandment*. "Hear, O Israel: The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might." This commandment is so central to Jews that it is referred to as the *Shema* prayer. The name is taken from the first word of this verse in Hebrew, meaning "hear" or "listen." Jesus himself would have recited it many times, beginning in his childhood.

The rabbis, scribes, and Pharisees of Jesus' day were somewhat like police officers, lawyers, and judges today; their professions revolved around teaching, enforcing, interpreting, and debating laws—in their case, the 613 laws in the Old Testament. So when a scribe approached Jesus to ask him which is the first of all the commandments, Jesus didn't have to think twice—of course it would be the *Shema*. The surprise would have been that Jesus immediately added a second half to this great commandment: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Interestingly, Jesus didn't make up the second law here; he is quoting Leviticus 19:18.

When it came to interpreting laws, Jesus didn't back away from the usual Jewish debates even though he wasn't a part of the religious hierarchy of his day. He knew the laws of the Old Testament just as well as the highest trained authorities. What Jesus was able to do better than most, and what he spent much of his time doing in his teaching, was helping others put the laws in their proper con-



texts. He had no patience for officials who found fault with those who committed minor infractions (such as not washing the outside of a cup correctly). More important to him were the laws that focused on how to love. He was a master at putting the laws together to keep the focus on loving God, self, and others.

Questions of the Week

- 1 What does it mean to you to love God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength? How do you try to do that?
